LOS ANGELES (November 2007) -- Many Americans still do not know that newborn children of Belarus, the most afflicted region of the **Chernobyl nuclear meltdown of 1986, suffer from the effects of radiation**; causing birth defects and devastating malformations.

Many Americans are not aware that those inhabiting the region of Belarus (former Soviet Union) are still experiencing horrific consequences to the 1986 Chernobyl reactor explosion. Most impacted are the children. In Belarus, only 15% - 20% of the babies are reported to be born normal, with the remaining children experiencing serious health conditions to include holes in their hearts, genetic disorders, and serious physical deformities.

Many of the facts offered to the public surrounding the Chernobyl meltdown have been questioned, due to the overwhelming denial by the former USSR Government that conditions were as bad as they resulted to be. Before the reactor explosion, these orphanages and asylums did not exist. Since the incident, there have been overwhelming increases in diseases such a thyroid cancer which has reported increased by 210%. **There also seems to be a cultural consequence that impacts these small children, as the caretakers often see them as being "cursed" or "infected", but mostly not viable human beings with thoughts, feelings, and a future.**

Until recently, these incidences in children were kept under-wraps due to certain turmoil it could cause to surrounding countries and the world at large. In fact, radiation from the 1986 Chernobyl meltdown spread hundreds-of-thousands of miles, including to the Unites States and Australia, yet the former USSR government diminished this disaster in the press, stating that the effects of the radiation were minimal.

On November 13, the "**Outside The Box**" group, a unique educational program for babies that focuses on brain development by using multi-sensory learning tools and activities, will honor the Chernobyl Children's Project International by holding a fundraiser in **Aidin's Place, at the Westwood Recreation Center. From 12pm to 4pm at the address: 1350 South Sepulveda at Rochester Avenue in Westwood, California, to help fund a trip to Belarus for volunteers, nurses and doctors**, in order to help care for the many disfigured children who are living with the turmoil that this major event has caused. Many of these children are not bathed, changed, held or taught to deal with normal society. They often sleep in their own urine, vomit and feces, and have horrible cases of bed sores.

Love Me Baby Me's luxurious and gentle products will be sent with the volunteers in an effort to help create a more comfortable existence for these children. The company's '**Bubbly Wash**' is soft and gentle, tear-free, and does not contain ingredients in other baby products that contribute to Urinary Tract Infection.
